## Unofficial English translation of French circular verbal note dated 15 April 2024

The Permanent Mission of Switzerland to the United Nations Office and other international organisations in Geneva presents its compliments to the international organisations based in Switzerland and has the honour to inform them of the following, in agreement with the State Secretariat for Migration (SEM), concerning foreign nationals benefiting from temporary protection status ("S" status).

## "S" status granted by Switzerland

Foreign nationals, domiciled in Switzerland, who have been granted an "S" status by the SEM, competent federal authority, may be employed by international organisations as staff members with the privileges and immunities arising from headquarters agreements. The Swiss Mission issues them with a legitimation card from the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA) after they have renounced to their "S" status.

They must indeed renounce their "S" status <u>before being hired</u> and inform the SEM of this renunciation by using the intended form (see Annex). Their stay in Switzerland is then authorised by a FDFA legitimation card, which validity is limited to the duration of their contract. The international organisation must request the issuance of a FDFA legitimation card following the usual procedure, while enclosing a copy of SEM's confirmation letter regarding the renunciation of the "S" status.

At the end of their functions, respectively when they lose their entitlement to their FDFA legitimation card, they may request the SEM to reinstate their "S" status, provided they are still domiciled in Switzerland. The decision of the Swiss Federal Council remains reserved as it communicated on 1 November 2023 that this status would not be lifted before 4 March 2025<sup>1</sup>.

Foreign nationals, domiciled in Switzerland, who could potentially have obtained an "S" status <u>before taking up their functions</u>, who lose their entitlement to their FDFA legitimation card at the end of their contract and who did not have a residence or settlement permit (B or C permit), may also apply for an "S" status. The decision of the Swiss Federal Council remains reserved as it communicated on 1 November 2023 that this status would not be lifted before 4 March 2025<sup>1</sup>.

It remains understood that foreign nationals domiciled in Switzerland who, before taking up their functions, held a B or C permit, which they exchanged for a FDFA legitimation card, may regain their permit in accordance with the applicable rules (cf. point 4.1 of the Guidelines<sup>2</sup>).

The aforementioned rules <u>do not apply</u> to foreign nationals with "S" status, domiciled in Switzerland, who are employed by international organisations as <u>non-staff members</u> (consultants and interns). They retain their "S" status and remain subject to ordinary Swiss law. International organisations do not have to register them with the Swiss Mission (see point 6 of the Guidelines<sup>2</sup>).

## Protection status (similar to "S" status) granted by a foreign State

Foreign nationals who, at the time of their hiring by an international organisation in Switzerland, hold a protection status granted to them by another country and who come to <u>live in Switzerland</u>, must renounce their protection status by informing the authorities of the country that granted it to them. The international organisation must provide written proof of renunciation of the protection status when requesting the issuance of a FDFA legitimation card in their favour, whether they are staff members or non-staff members.

At the end of their functions, when they lose their entitlement to their FDFA legitimation card and if they are still living in Switzerland, they must return to the country where they previously held a protection status. In such cases, Switzerland does not grant "S" status in accordance with the principle of subsidiarity.

Those who remain <u>domiciled abroad</u> during their functions (for example, on the German border region or in neighboring France) must, <u>before being hired</u> by an international organisation, ensure with the foreign authorities that have granted them a protection status that they are <u>authorised to work in Switzerland</u>. The international organisation must provide written proof of this when requesting the issuance of a FDFA legitimation card in their favour, whether they are staff members or non-staff members. The Swiss Mission recalls, for all intends and purposes, that the FDFA legitimation card serves in particular as a residence permit in Switzerland, but not abroad. The foreign nationals concerned must therefore ensure the continuity and legality of their stay in their country of residence for the duration of their contract in Switzerland with the international organisation.

## Recruitment procedure

It is the responsibility of the international organisations to verify, at the recruitment stage or before the transfer to Switzerland, the exact situation of foreign nationals with "S" status in Switzerland or with a similar protection status aboard, by informing them of the steps they are required to take before coming to Switzerland or taking up their functions. The Swiss Mission will then be able to determine their entitlement to a FDFA legitimation card on the basis of the information provided by the international organisations.
